





# BACK TO SCHOOL: SHOPPING WITH KIWANIS



"Members of the Kiwanis Club of Galt, saw an issue in their own community...and stepped in to help!"

School supplies and clothing are two of the most basic and important necessities when beginning a new school year. Members of the **Kiwanis Club of Galt**, saw an issue in their own community, a small city with a large low-income population, and stepped in to help.

The Kiwanis Club partnered with counselors at local elementary schools, dental professionals and Walmart, and the Galt club identified 12 of the most disadvantaged children in their community. Kiwanis members treated them to breakfast, a back-to-school shopping spree, and a lesson on the importance of oral hygiene, which included free dental supplies.

Elizabeth Haglund, President of the Kiwanis Club of Galt noted, "The project was a very big success in helping families in need with new school clothes, socks, shoes, underwear, etc."

Thanks to these selfless Kiwanis, these disadvantaged children were provided with the supplies necessary to start the new school year on the right foot!



Delegates are **dues paid** members that vote to approve **bylaw changes**, approve **resolutions** presented to the House of Delegates, and to **select the leaders of the District** for the next term. **Each** dues paid club is allowed **two (2) delegates** that will represent the club during House of Delegates.


### How do I sign up?

# District Officer Candidate Training Conference

### Who should attend?

Key Club member interested in running for District Officer Position (Governor, Secretary, or Treasurer) **must** attend the Candidate Training Conference (CTC).

### When and Where?

Date: Saturday, February 2, 2019

Times: 10:30am - 4:30pm

Location South: Kiwanis Professional Center, 8360 Red Oak Street, Rancho Cucamonga, CA 91730

Location North: Kiwanis Family House, 2875 50th Street, Sacramento CA 95817

### Reminder

Travel: Participants who will be flying to District CTC can be reimbursed. If so, contact Mr. Roberson and Mr. Bruce Hennings immediately with flight plans. Must be scheduled at least two weeks in advance.

Dress Code: Key Club Casual

### District CTC Registration.

This is **mandatory** if you want to be a candidate for one of the District Officer Positions. Registration can be found on the CNH Cyberkey. The deadline to register is January

25, 2019.

# Running for International Office: ENDORSEMENT

- 1. MUST attend International Office Candidate Training Conference (this is mandatory if you want to run for District Endorsement at DCON which is required in order to run for one of the International Officer positions.)
  - > Register on the CNH Cyber Key
- 2. Register on-line your intent to file to run for District endorsement for an International Officer Position
  - > Register on the CNH Cyber Key by February 25, 2019 using the link: TINYURL.COM/CNH\_DISTRICT\_CANDIDATE


