






Taking The Leap





WHAT IS IT?

Candidate Training Conference (CTC) is where Key Clubbers come to learn more about what a Lieutenant Governor for anyone who wants to run, and how Key Club works on the division & district level!

WHY SHOULD YOU GO?

Even if you don't plan on running for LTG or have doubts about running, CTC is a great way to learn more about what it means to be a leader. You can meet other passionate Key Clubbers, and talk one-on-one with LTG's about their experiences as an LTG. You can also fulfill your training conference requirement on the MRP.

HOW CAN YOU SIGN UP?

Ask your respective Lieutenant Governor or the Lieutenant Governors in your region for more information on CTC! You won't regret attending, we hope to see you as a future LTG candidate!

MEMBER RECOGNITION PROGRAM

What is the Member Recognition Program?

The CNH Member Recognition Program is a year round program to recognize a large number of dues-paid Key Club members who have shown dedication in service, leadership, and fellowship.

The four levels of recognition on the rubric are:

- **Bronze** - Certificate
- **Silver** - Certificate
- **Gold** - Certificate
- **Platinum** - Medal & Certificate

In order to qualify for certain levels, an individual must reach certain requirements such as serving a specific number of hours, going to certain events, and more. The guidelines can be found [here](#).

How are online events counted?

Online events this term will be counted. It will be announced prior to the event if it counts toward an MRP category. Secretaries will have to adjust and follow the new rubric!


Dues Payment

Each Key Club is required to pay at least \$11.50 per year for dues for each of its members. \$7 goes to International, and shall be paid as required by Key Club International. Dues for CNH are \$4.50 respectively. Dues are effective on the date that the member is inducted, or, in the case of a continuing member, on October 1. A membership list, also known as the roster from the Membership Update Center website, must accompany the dues payment.

Policy 128 Member Dues



What Does This Mean



All Key Club members must pay membership dues every term. Out of the overall dues payment of \$11.50, \$4.50 is dedicated to the district and \$7 is dedicated to Key Club International.

Why Is This Important

Dues help us run this organization by allocating funds to spend on scholarships, division budgets, and membership materials. Without dues, Key Club would not be able to function!



Due Process

When an officer is failing to fulfill their duties, the Board of Directors should help the officer learn and grow from their mistakes. **Removal from office is the last resort.**

1. The president, vice president, and advisor should meet with the officer in question to privately discuss how the officer can improve their performance.

Any member may recommend the removal of a club officer to the Board of Directors.

2. If the officer continues to fail to fulfill their responsibilities, the Board of Directors will hold a meeting to either approve or reject the recommendation.

3. If approved, a meeting will be held with the entire club to vote on the removal of the officer. 2/3rds quorum of dues paid members is required in order for the removal to be approved.

The school, advisors, and LTG should be notified of the removal.

4. In the event any officers should be removed from office, the officer should be notified by the secretary in writing.

PEDIATRIC TRAUMA PROGRAM

“Our club teamed up with two other clubs in our division at the beginning of September to host an event that focused on PTP. (Modesto High and Grace Davis). To prepare for the event, all the officers per club attended the Zoom sessions with our LTG that were held to discuss the logistics and delegate tasks and roles from each club. During this event, the hosts displayed a slideshow on how to sign in along with a short PTP informational video, followed by the directions and requirements for the infographic. This



way, Key Clubbers are able to access the directions/requirements/submissions easier. We made sure that members were citing their information and giving proper credit to their sources. Throughout the remainder of the meeting, soft Lofi music was played along with other music suggestions to brighten the mood while members made infographics. Overall, this educational service event was an amazing

learning experience for many of our new members who were unaware of one of our biggest preferred charities, the Pediatric Trauma Program. We provided many visual and factual resources to allow members to gain insight on PTP and implement their own ideas to raise awareness and advocate for children's safety. We successfully received a total of 31 infographics from both of our sessions and are planning to display them on our club newsletters and social media.”

PREVENTING PEDIATRIC TRAUMA: FALL PREVENTION

Falls are the **leading cause** of non-fatal injuries for **ALL** children ages 0 to 19. Each day, about **8,000** children are treated in the United States emergency room for fall-related injuries. That's almost **2.8 million children A YEAR**.

Many of these falls are **PREVENTABLE!**

HOW TO PREVENT FALLS

PLAY SAFELY	SAFER HOME	SPORTS SAFETY
The most common cause of injury is a fall on the playground . Ensure that the surfaces UNDER the playground are safe, soft, and of the appropriate material . It should also be the right depth and well-maintained.	Utilize home safety devices like window guards, stair gates, and guard rails. These safety devices are meant to help prevent an active child from taking a dangerous tumble down a fall height!	Practice proper safety measures as your child plays sports to help prevent injury during harmful accidents. Have them wear protective gear like wrist guards, knee and elbow pads, and a helmet.

SUPERVISION

In general, **supervision over your children is the key to protecting them from pediatric trauma**. Supervise young children when they are around potential fall hazards like the stairs and playground equipment **AT ALL TIMES**, whether you are at home or in public.

"I had planned this event back in March because it was supposed to take place before quarantine. What the fundrive does, is collected clothes, toys and other donations get dropped off at our local Savers store (similar to Goodwill) and in exchange, they reward us with a price per pound to help our organization fundraise. For this event, we made sure to get a lot of participation by making several flyers, posting on social media, reaching out to people in our division, etc. I was the main collection person, but a couple other officers stored the clothing in our houses until our drop off date on September 27th. This project impacted our club, because unexpectedly, this event was able to over achieve our fundraising goal by double. This project alone raised about \$600 for the pediatric trauma program as we donated over 2,300 pounds of stuff. The project was very successful because not only did it raise funds, but the donations also go to a good cause because they are sold at low cost to people in our community who need it. An aspect of the service project that was unlucky was the time frame because covid-19 pushed our drop off date back by 5 months. However, I don't think any improvements would need to have been made, and I encourage other schools to take a look at a FunDrive clothing drive opportunity!"

birthday wishes for ptp patients

"Our Key Club, VCPA, collaborated with Beyer's Key Club to make this happen. Originally we had planned to make infographics focused on bike helmet safety, but during a meeting with the two clubs (and LTG Monica In joining us), Monica suggested to us that we make birthday cards or "get well soon" cards for PTP children in the hospital (Valley Children's Hospital). Both clubs loved the so idea we went with it. In that same meeting we figured out the details (dates, times, who would host the Zoom meetings, digital and physical submissions, and the ice breaker idea). We ended up hosting the event for three days (9/28 - 8/30) from 4:00 - 5:00 pm each day. Digital cards would be emailed to both me and Beyer's president and physical submissions would be mailed to VCPA's campus. For the execution of the event, our ice breaker was playing a game of 'Among Us' (phone app) and then we let participants work on their cards for the rest of time while playing music."


