


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

Your financial aid eligibility is determined by cost of attendance minus expected family contribution.

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID

What are the different types of financial aid?

GRANTS

Federal or state money that is given to students and does not need to be repaid; can be merit-based or need-based

LOANS

Money that students borrow to attend college; **must be repaid**; offered by federal government or private institutions

WORK STUDY

A program where students can earn money to help pay for school; federally funded jobs on campus or other approved locations

SCHOLARSHIPS

Money that does not have to be repaid; awarded by various organizations/companies based on a number of factors; take time and research



STEPS TO APPLY

1. File for the correct financial aid form

- If you are a US Citizen or eligible non-citizen
FAFSA (Free application for Federal Student Aid)

- If you are an undocumented student
CA Dream Act

2. Submit a GPA verification form

3. Submit any follow-up documents that your college asks for

- ★ Costs for traveling will depend on your transportation of choice and location.
- ★ Cheaper rooms are on a first come, first serve basis. Costs will range from **\$120-\$150 per room a night.**

On-Time Registration: \$223 per person, RECEIVED by 2/26/21

Late Registration: \$263 per person, RECEIVED by 3/12/21

What Is The Purpose Of Grants?

The Kiwanis Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund offers an array of grant programs to our Kiwanis and Service Leadership Program clubs to enhance and further their efforts to build a better future for our children.

Grant Programs & What We Can Do With Them

➤ CLUB GRANTS

The Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund supports **Kiwanis clubs' interest in their local community needs**. Often, however, a community need may far exceed a club's ability to get the project started. The Club Grant Program was developed in 1984 to **assist clubs with seed money** when the scope of a service project exceeds the club's financial resources.

➤ DISASTER ASSISTANCE

The Disaster Assistance Project Grant Program was established by the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund to **assist Kiwanians and their clubs in providing immediate disaster relief assistance** in the event of a natural disaster. To assist clubs in this endeavor, the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund makes **available club grants for service projects**.

➤ PEDIATRIC TRAUMA PROGRAM (PTP)

The Pediatric Trauma Prevention Grant Program was established by the Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund to provide grants to assist Kiwanis and Service Leadership Programs (SLP) clubs in **financing new service projects which address pediatric trauma** and injury prevention. **Grants will be given to clubs for projects which seek to prevent and/or treat pediatric trauma** – defined as sudden, unintentional physical injury.

➤ PTP FOR PARTNERED HOSPITALS

The PTP Grant Program for Partner Hospitals makes available grants to our Partner Hospitals to **assist them with their unfunded needs** directly related to pediatric trauma and injury prevention.

➤ SPECIAL OLYMPICS/ SPECIAL NEEDS COMMUNITY

The Special Olympics/ Special Needs Community grant program was established to **assist Kiwanis clubs and divisions in financing Special Olympics projects or projects that support the Special Needs community**. The Cal-Nev-Ha Children's Fund makes available Special Olympics/ Special Needs Community grants for projects by providing funds up to \$1,000.00.

What is *Key To College*?



Key to College is a program **hosted by Circle K**. It focuses on providing us Key Clubbers tips and advice on how to get through college. Through various workshops on topics from college applications to time management, **students gain insight on what college is like and get prepared** to pursue higher education!

Why should *YOU* attend?

It is **a one of a kind experience** that will help you prepare for college! You can expect genuine responses to your questions from panelists and in workshops. This is **a great opportunity to expand your knowledge about colleges** and it is **never too early to prepare**. spotlight on service program august CHILDREN'S EDUCATION


elementary school virtual tutoring

Benicia | D08 | R9

"As our school transitioned from in-person learning to virtual learning, Benicia Key Club wanted to provide their support to local elementary school students who might be struggling with schoolwork.

The board of officers emailed all of the elementary school principals in our school district to offer our tutoring services. Soon, we got in contact with a fourth grade teacher, met and observed his class on one of their Zoom meetings, and started tutoring. We utilized a spreadsheet to assign members with 4th graders and tutored both math and English. Members have been tutoring via Zoom starting in July and throughout the entire month of August. Though quarantine has limited our in-person service events, virtual

tutoring has been a solution that let members keep in touch with their community. Bonds were created between the 4th graders and Key Club members. Additionally, our club established tutoring as one of our yearly service events in which members can earn service hours. Elementary schools in our area now know of our club and know to reach out to us when in need of our services. Of course, this project could have been improved if more Key Club members participated. Not all of the 4th graders got assigned a tutor and if we were to start over, we would try to encourage more members to sign up to tutor. However, overall this project was highly successful and a couple of members will even continue tutoring through the school year!"



at-home service

Oxford Academy | D30S | R3

"Throughout the month of August, our club had two service projects that helped children get more access to educational resources and opportunities. Since we couldn't hold any in-person events or fundraisers, we used online apps and websites as an alternative. One of the apps that we used was Charity Miles, which turned the miles walked/ran by volunteers into donations for charity. The charities that targeted children's education included Pencils of Promise, She's the First, Action for Healthy Kids, and McKinley Children's Center. The organizations help build schools, provide education services for children, create healthier schools, and make sure that every child has an equal opportunity for education. Volunteers downloaded the app, chose a charity, then ran/walked to raise money for these charities. The other service project that we did was UNICEF's Math for Good Challenge, in which volunteers answered math questions in order to help get children into school and out of poverty. Each math question answered unlocked a \$0.25 donation to UNICEF. We created a Google Form for both service projects so volunteers could submit proof of their participation in the projects and so we could keep track of their hours."

"Prior to the term, my club did not really know much about the District SOSOP, so learning more about it from our Lieutenant Governor, Emily Vu, really inspired us to find ways to take initiative and participate in these programs! One of the SOSOP themes that really spoke out to us was Children's Education, as our Key Club had previously worked with a non-profit organization called Rising Youth Association (RYA), which focused on tutoring underprivileged children. Our experience with RYA meant a lot to us so we really want to help in any way we can while in quarantine. For this event, we were able to get 55 active participants, which is amazing! I felt like we were really able to engage both our introverted and extroverted members. In the beginning of the event, we focused on playing a little emoji guessing game which helped to ease any tension between the members on the call. We also played music throughout the event, which was more tailored towards the introverted people who may have preferred to work in silence."

- **Division Judging Committee** consist of $\frac{1}{3}$ of Key Clubs in the division are required to be represented.

Tips for Division Contest

1. Contact your respective Lt. Governor for deadline.
2. Look through each Division Contest guidelines carefully.
3. Start your e-portfolio as soon as possible in order to not procrastinate.
4. Ask other clubs and members for help and even for ideas.
5. Truly showcase what your club is all about.

Year in Review



The Year in Review contest is for clubs who want to artistically showcase their club's accomplishments for the year. There's two categories, traditional/ non-traditional and digital. Traditional and nontraditional are international events. They will first be judged on a district level at DCON 2021 and the top two distinguished winners will then go on to compete at ICON 2021. The digital Year in Review is NOT an international event.

REMEMBER

- You can ONLY enter either the traditional/non-traditional OR digital YIR
- Digital YIR is a district judged contest while traditional is an international contest!
- MUST keep record of how much you spend, max \$300


